Chapter Three

3.1 Introduction

The vision for the City of Sunrise parks and recreation system is intended to be implemented over time as funding opportunities become available. The vision may also need to adapt to changing development trends, population, and demographics as they a continue to evolve.

In June of 2013 AECOM conducted an implementation workshop with key City of Sunrise staff to identify a realistic strategy to implement the vision. Key elements of the strategy include:

- Estimate of probable costs
- Available and projected funding
- Phasing strategies and project prioritization

3.2 **Estimate of Probable Costs**

Implementation of the parks and recreation vision is estimated to cost approximately \$90M:

- Parks and Facilities Improvements (\$74 million)
- Signage, Wayfinding, Community Branding (\$600,000)
- Bikeways and Trails (\$15 million)

Additionally, on-going operations and maintenance (O&M) costs are projected to cost approximately 5 percent of the capital costs, or an additional \$3.9 million annually. Figure 3.1-3.2 includes a summarized breakdown of estimated capital costs of the projects within the vision; a detailed cost estimate for the individual vision projects can be found within the Appendix.

Costs shown are 'order-of-magnitude' costs which are intended for planning purposes only, and will need to be refined through detailed planning and design. It is recommended that each proposed project undergo a detailed feasibility and costs analysis prior to physical implementation. Actual costs could vary significantly depending on many factors including but not limited to;

- Timeframe of implementation
- Individual project scale
- Changing land acquisition costs
- Property market rise/decline
- Raw products and materials costs

3.3 Projected Funding Sources

City staff estimates that annual approximate revenues generated by the Leisure Services Department include:

• City/County CIP - streets, park improvement: \$2.9M

Concession revenues: \$30,000
Donations and gifts: \$8,000
Park impact fees: \$16,000

Grants: \$325,000User fees: \$1,200,000Sponsorships: \$20,000

ESTIMATED TOTAL ANNUAL REVENUES: +/- \$4.5M

These monies are deposited in the City's General Fund, which funds both capital and annual Operations and Maintenance (O&M) costs as identified in the annual budget.

3.4 Alternative Phasing Strategies and Project Prioritization

This section focuses on funding the first +/- \$64 million needed for Parks and Facilities Improvements, and Signage, Wayfinding, Community Branding. It is assumed that the +/- \$15 million bikeways and trails projects of the vision will continue to be developed through County, state and federal funding.

Currently the City funds new parks and facilities improvements on a 'pay as you go' basis, limiting spending to available resources as stated above. The City currently has no debt, and has bonding capacity to finance parks and recreation projects if desired and approved by residents and the City Commission. Therefore the two primary funding strategies to implement the vision are:

- Pay As You Go
- Bonding

Following is a discussion of each.

3.4.1 Pay As You Go Option

Over the past 10 years the City has funded approximately \$2 million/year on park capital improvement projects. Assuming that the City continues to fund park improvements at the same level each year, this equates to a \$20 million capital improvements program over the next ten years, or almost one third of the \$74 million parks vision.

Findings from the 2010 Needs Assessment survey indicate that residents' top spending priorities include:

- Small neighborhood parks
- Indoor fitness and exercise facilities
- Off-leash dog parks
- Picnic areas and shelters
- Nature areas/wildlife habitats

Based on these priorities, following is a proposed 10-year, \$20 million capital improvements program:

PHASE ONE: TEN YEAR, \$20 M, 'PAY-AS-YOU-GO' CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM

3.4.2. Bonding

In addition to funding capital projects on a Pay As You Go basis, the City may also wish to consider issuing bonds. It is estimated that approximately \$20,000,000 in additional funding for park improvements could be generated by increasing ad valorem taxes approximately 1/3 mil (+/- \$33.51 per year) for 20 years. Based on residents' priorities as outlined above, these monies could be used to fund the following priority projects:

3.5. Action Plan

General actions to implement the Sunrise Leisure Services System vision include:

- 1. Determine the City's preferred strategy for funding parks and recreation improvements as discussed above
- 2. Refine the prioritization list and implementation strategy based on available and projected funding including general fund, bonds, and/or grants.
- 3. If the City chooses to raise funds through bonding, develop an educational campaign to inform and educate residents regarding specific projects and benefits.
- 4. Identify, evaluate, and acquire parcels for new neighborhood parks, dog parks and/or other priority improvements.
- 5. Prepare master plans and construction documents for top priority projects to better define proposed improvements.
- 6. Initiate permitting, bidding, and construction of top priority improvements.
