Sunrise is proud to be a partner in Broward County's Conservation Pays program, which provides rebates and other water conservation resources. Be sure to take advantage of the following benefits:

Toilet Rebates. While supplies last, eligible Sunrise Water Utility customers can receive rebates of up to \$100 per toilet (two per household) for replacing qualifying pre-1994 toilets with WaterSense® certified toilets. You must apply and be approved for your rebate BEFORE purchasing a new toilet: Register online at www.conservationpays.com or call (800) 270-9794.

Free Shower Heads and Faucet Aerators. Sunrise Water Utility customers can receive free shower heads and kitchen and bathroom faucet aerators that help reduce water and energy costs. These items are available at the City of Sunrise Utility Administration Building (777 Sawgrass Corporate Parkway) weekdays between 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Please call (954) 888-6000 to schedule a pick-up time, and bring your water bill and a photo ID with your address. (If you're not direct-billed for water service, only proof of address is needed.)

Are You Prepared for Hurricane Season? Hurricane Season begins on June 1 and continues through November 30. Now is a great time to kick start your storm preparedness:

Create (and Practice) a Household Disaster Plan

If you need to leave your home, where will you go – and how will you keep in touch? Maintain an up-to-date list of contact information and share it with family members and friends. Visit www.ready.gov/hurricanes to print and customize a Family Emergency Communication Plan.

Assemble an Emergency Kit

If a storm hits, you may need to survive independently for several days. Prepare now by placing your family's necessities in plastic bins or bags that will keep them dry (and portable). A basic emergency kit should contain:

- Water – one gallon per person per day for at least three days
- Food – at least a three-day supply of non-perishable items, as well as a manual can opener
- First aid kit and any prescription medicine required by family members
- Flashlights, a battery-powered or hand-crank radio, and extra batteries
- Cell phone with chargers and backup batteries
- Cash and copies of important documents – such as birth certificates and insurance policies

Make Sure Your Yard is Storm-Ready

Once a hurricane watch or warning has been issued, it's too late to cut back vegetation and have it safely removed. Any debris that remains at the curb can damage your home – or your neighbor's home – when the wind picks up. Be sure to examine all trees and other foliage before storm season and make arrangements for any necessary tree maintenance.

If a storm warning has been declared, residents should bring loose objects and equipment inside that could become projectiles in high winds (e.g., patio furniture, bicycles, garbage carts) and anchor objects that are unsafe to bring inside (e.g., grills, propane tanks).

Do not place tree trimmings, landscaping debris, or other items out for garbage or bulk trash collection just before a storm. These services are discontinued prior to and following storm events, and won't resume until crews can safely pick-up and dispose of items.

The City is Your Partner in Preparedness

Sunrise Fire-Rescue has an Emergency Management Division that operates year-round. This specialized team works closely with other agencies – including Broward County, the State of Florida, and the National Weather Service – to monitor storm activity and recommend action as necessary.
