1. Introduction

BACKGROUND

The City of Sunrise has been an entitlement City for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program since 1988. The CDBG Program, established in 1974, is designed to help communities remain viable by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expanded economic opportunities principally for low- to moderate-income persons.

PURPOSE

This Annual Action Plan describes the activities which will be undertaken during the 2019 federal fiscal year (October 1, 2019 - September 30, 2020) using funds granted to the City of Sunrise by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to address priority needs identified in the City's FY 2015-2019 Consolidated Strategic Plan adopted by Resolution No. 15-81 on May 26, 2015.

As a HUD entitlement grantee, the City of Sunrise receives an annual allocation of funds from the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) and the HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME). The City's HOME funding is received through its participation in the Broward County HOME Consortium. In addition to the federally funded programs listed above, the City of Sunrise is a grantee of the State Housing Initiatives Partnership Program (SHIP). Consistent with state and federal regulations, the activities and accomplishments described in this report primarily benefit low- and moderate-income residents of the City of Sunrise, neighborhoods with high concentrations of low- and moderate-income households, and the City as a whole. The low-income reference throughout the report includes all low-income categories in compliance with HUD regulations. Responses to questions asked in each section are based upon the original Five Year Consolidated Strategic Plan.

Annual Action Plan 2019 – Amended May 25, 2021 Federal programs covered by the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and 2019 Annual Action Plan are the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program and the HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program by way of the City's participation in the Broward County HOME Consortium.

RESOURCES

Anticipated resources for the FY2019 funding year include \$670,780 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds as well as \$160,000 of HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) Funds as pass through from the Broward County HOME Consortium. Additionally, an estimated \$100,000 of State Housing Initiative Partnership funding is anticipated to be received during the 2019 program year. The total estimated funding for the FY2019 program year is expected to be \$930,780.



Amendment - June 9, 2020

These funds, leveraged with CDBG funds, will be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19.

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act was passed by Congress on March 27, 2020. The City of Sunrise received an additional \$599,957 entitlement allocation from the CARES Act identified as CDBG-CV3 funding. These funds, leveraged with CDBG funds, will be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19.

The City's Consolidated Strategic Plan for fiscal years 2015 – 2019 identified affordable housing, self-sufficiency, quality of life and special needs assistance as the highest priority needs amongst low- and moderate-income residents. As such, the FY 2019 Annual Action Plan applies the following strategies to target the social, economic and housing needs of these populations.

 title services for income eligible.
- <u>SHIP Roof Replacement Program:</u> Assists low- and moderate-income households prevent water penetration of the home by replacement of deteriorated roofing systems.
- <u>SHIP Purchase Assistance Program:</u> Assists low- and moderate-income households prevent water penetration of the home by replacement of deteriorated roofing systems.

Self-Sufficiency: Protect and enhance the condition of the City's housing stock and neighborhoods

• <u>SHIP Disaster Mitigation Program:</u> Assists low- and moderate-income households to reduce their energy costs through weatherization while also protecting the City's owner-occupied housing.

Quality of Life: Support code enforcement activities in low- and moderate-income areas

• <u>Code Enforcement:</u> Supports code enforcement activities to enforce quality of life ordinances in low- and moderate-income areas in an effort to stabilize neighborhoods, create a safe environment for residents, and preserve the City's affordable housing.

Special Needs Assistance: Addresses housing and accessibility improvements amongst special needs populations

- <u>SHIP Architectural Barrier Removal:</u> Facilitates essential modifications to owner-occupied residences to address health, safety and accessibility needs
- <u>Senior Transportation</u>: Provides transportation to medical facilities for elderly low- and moderate-income residents



7. Summary

The City of Sunrise, located in southeast Florida, is a municipality comprised of over 18 square miles and over 85,000 residents within fully developed Broward County. During FY 2019, the City will leverage CDBG and HOME funds with its annual allocation of SHIP funding to meet its highest priority needs, as indicated in the 2015 – 2019 Consolidated Strategic Plan.

The 2015 - 2019 Consolidated Strategic Plan includes several goals and objectives divided into four broad categories

- Affordable Housing
- Non-Housing Community Development
- Homelessness
- Non-Homeless Special Needs

Within these categories, the City has identified the following priorities as its areas of greatest need amongst low- and moderate-income residents. As such, the FY 2019 Annual Action Plan will employ strategies to directly address each priority listed below for a combined impact to the social, economic and housing needs of the City's low- and moderate-income residents.

- Priority 1 Affordable Housing: Remove barriers to the provision of affordable housing
- Priority 2 Self-Sufficiency: Protect and enhance the condition of the City's housing stock and neighborhoods
- Priority 3 Quality of Life: Support code enforcement activities in low- and moderate-income areas
- **Priority 4 Special Needs Assistance:** Addresses housing and accessibility improvements amongst special needs population
- **Priority 5 Public Services:** Public services to low- to moderate-income individuals and households. Services include, but are not limited to, activities to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19.
- Priority 6 Economic Opportunity: Addresses the economic impact of COVID-19 on small businesses within the City.

The above strategies were established during the 2015-2019 Consolidated Planning process, based upon available data, staff experience and community observation; and confirmed by the citizen participation and consultation processes. Priorities 5 and 6 have been included in the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan, as amended.

1. Introduction

Below please find a summary of the consultation efforts undertaken as a part of the City's 2015-2019 Consolidated Strategic Planning process. City consultation efforts included input from the Florida Housing Finance Corporation, Broward County, various local non-profit direct service providers, neighboring municipalities and private citizens.

Institutional coordination of the Consolidated Plan establishes a unified vision for use of community development funds and related resources. The City uses a collaborative process to shape various programs into effective, coordinated strategies. This process also facilitates the opportunity for planning and citizen participation to take place in a comprehensive context, attempting to reduce duplication of effort at the local level. The City initiated the collaboration process by updating the list. Maintaining the list is an ongoing process. The results shown in Table 2, located in the subsequent section, are based on the returned questionnaires mailed out.

The City will execute this Annual Action Plan in harmony with public, private and nonprofit agencies. Nonprofit agencies may include, but are not limited to, service providers and community housing development organizations. Private sector partners may include, but are not limited to, local financial institutions, developers and local businesses. The City works closely with its partners to design programs that address identified needs.

Table 2, located in the subsequent section, outlines the types of agencies and organizations consulted throughout the program year and during the development of the City of Sunrise Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan. Organizations consulted included the Broward County Housing Authority, Broward County Housing Initiatives Partnership, Center for Independent Living, Habitat for Humanity, and Henderson Mental Health Center, among others.

In preparation of Table 2, City staff conducted phone calls and researched the internet for the agencies. As stated above, the City often relies on the Broward County Housing Finance and Community Development Division to assist in fostering these relationships with public and assisted housing providers and other public service organizations.

The City of Sunrise does not receive or administer an Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG). Consultation with the Broward County Housing Initiative Partnership (HIP), Continuum of Care lead agency included stakeholder meetings with the Broward County HOME Consortium at which HIP was in attendance. The HIP is responsible for the operation and administration of the Broward County's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). A questionnaire was sent to the Broward County Homeless Initiative Partnership. There are also individual phone and e-mail contacts with the HIP Administrator.

The City of Sunrise does not receive or administer an Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG). Consultation with the Broward County Housing Initiative Partnership (HIP), Continuum of Care lead agency included stakeholder meetings with the Broward County HOME Consortium at which HIP was in attendance. The HIP is responsible for the operation and administration of the Broward County's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). At the January 15, 2015 Broward County HOME Consortium Meeting, staff of the Broward County Housing Finance and Community Development Division introduced staff from the Broward County Homeless Initiative Partnership (HIP). HIP representatives will once again be attending the HOME Consortium meetings to provide relevant updates and information such as their implementation of the County's Point-In-Time Count that provides a snapshot of each jurisdiction's homeless population for the designated time period. HIP staff stated the review and reporting regarding performance measures, outcomes, and other relevant data from direct service providing stakeholder agencies who work with the homeless community. The Broward Regional Health Planning Council (BRHPC) is the agency subcontracted to implement the Point-In-Time count.

The Point-In-Time Homeless Count is federally mandated and every county is required to prepare one, not necessarily every year, but Broward County chooses to do one every year for both the sheltered and unsheltered population. It reports the homeless population over a 24-hour period. During 2019, the count commenced on January 23rd and concluded on January 26th. January 26th is the most important date in that 24-hour period. The count is an important evaluative factor for HUD in determining Broward County's homeless funding allocations.

Narrative

The City actively partners with many local non-profit community agencies. The City also works with County committees to support the goals of the provision of affordable, safe and sanitary housing, a suitable living environment, and expanded economic opportunities for low- and moderate-income persons within the City.

At a minimum, implicit in these goals is the City's commitment to providing coordinated community, housing and supportive services to its low-income residents. These services are provided through partnerships with government and quasi-government agencies, as well as respective planning efforts as shown in Table 3 above. The City will continue to encourage building partnerships between governments, lenders, builders, developers, real estate professionals, and advocates for low-income persons. The City will continue to work with the building industry, banking industry, real estate industry, social service providers and other community groups to promote the development of affordable housing and related housing services.

Anticipated resources for the FY2019 funding year include \$670,780 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds as well as \$160,085 of HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) Funds as pass through from the Broward County HOME Consortium. Additionally, an estimated \$120,438 of State Housing Initiative Partnership funding is anticipated to be received during the 2019 program year. The total estimated funding for the FY2019 program year is expected to be \$951,303.

Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied

During FY 2019, the City will leverage CDBG, HOME and CDBG-CV funds with its annual allocation of SHIP funding to meet its highest priority needs, as indicated in the 2015 – 2019 Consolidated Strategic Plan. As the lead agency of the Broward County HOME Consortium, compliance with HOME leveraging requirements will be fulfilled and reported through Broward County.

The leveraging of resources is vital to meeting the needs of the City's low- and moderate-income residents. Doing so ensures that all applicants are provided comprehensive support. To date, the City has been successful in leveraging CDBG and HOME funds with state-sponsored SHIP funding to increase the total dollars available to its applicants. As such, the City has made a significant impact in the community by achieving its goals and priorities as stated in the Consolidated Plan.

If appropriate, describe publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that may be used to address the needs identified in the plan

In early 2016, the City completed a series of five homes in partnership with Habitat for Humanity. All City-owned inventory has been mapped as part of the State's requirement that the City maintain a printed inventory of locally owned land suitable for affordable housing. The city is currently assessing what lots may be suitable for the development of in-fill housing and mixed-use development activities in conjunction with local non-profit agencies. In December of 2018, the City commission reviewed this inventory for suitability for use as affordable housing.

Discussion

Since its establishment as an entitlement City, the City of Sunrise has successfully leveraged CDBG and HOME funding with state and local resources to undertake activities that address the City's priority needs, with an emphasis on creating and maintaining affordable housing citywide.

Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

Housing costs have risen steadily over the past ten years. According to the most recent projections available from the Shimberg Center for Housing Studies, housing cost burden in the City of Sunrise reached 48% in 2016. This cost burden is further compounded to 77% of low- to moderate-income households. As such, affordable housing continues to be the primary focus of the City's activities.

As evidenced by growth of annual allocations from 2013 through 2018, CDBG funding levels are anticipated to continue to increase gradually through the end of the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan cycle. Although these increased allocations do indicate a relief from the aggressive funding reductions seen in program years 2005 through 2012, the restoration of funds is not proportionate to the rising cost of housing expenses in the City. In order create the greatest possible impact for its low- to moderate-income residents, the City will continue to leverage state and federal funding sources to mitigate the impact of these fluctuations. Additionally, the City will continue its dynamic advocacy of

affordable housing on local, state and federal levels.

STRATEGY: EXPEDITED PERMITTING

 <u>Established policy and procedures</u>: The City expedites affordable housing applications by prioritizing the application and assigning a specific planner to the project. This incentive was implemented on February 14, 1995, with the passage of Ordinance No. 402-95-B. This incentive is currently being utilized.

STRATEGY: ONGOING REVIEW PROCESS

An ongoing process for review of local policies, ordinances, regulations and plan provisions that increase the cost of housing prior to their adoption.

 <u>Established policy and procedures:</u> The Finance Department formulated the methodology for the analysis of this incentive, and the Community Development Department is responsible for performing the analysis and presenting the results to the decision makers. This incentive was implemented on October 1, 1997, to require the inclusion of an assessment of the financial impact on housing costs for all proposed land development or comprehensive plan amendments. The City Commission also holds two regular meetings per month during which all proposed changes are considered and discussed before adoption.

STRATEGY: INCREASED DENSITY LEVELS

• <u>Established policy and procedures:</u> The City considers increased density levels through Land Use Plan amendments. City Ordinance No. 402 adopted this incentive November 27, 1990.

STRATEGY: ZERO-LOT-LINE

• <u>Established policy and procedures:</u> The City allows zero-lot-line construction as provided by Ordinance No. 402. The incentive was adopted on November 27, 1990.

STRATEGY: DEFINITION OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING

• Established policy and procedures: The City of Sunrise defines affordable housing as defined in the SHIP Act. Affordable means that monthly mortgage payments, including taxes and insurance, do not exceed 30% of an amount representing the percentage of the area's median annual gross income for the household as indicated in subsections (19) (20), or (28). However, it is not the intent to limit an individual or household's ability to devote more than 30% of its income for housing. Housing for which a household devotes more than 30% of its income shall be deemed affordable if the institutional first mortgage lender is satisfied that the household can afford mortgage payments in excess of the 30% benchmark or, for rental housing, rents do not exceed those limits adjusted for bedroom size published annually by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation.

Discussion

The City of Sunrise has adopted the state-mandated Affordable Housing Incentive program that provides expedited review to affordable housing projects; and offers incentives, such as density bonuses, transfer of development rights, zero-lot line subdivisions, and some reductions in regulations for affordable housing.

Introduction

The City of Sunrise has been an entitlement City for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program since 1988. The CDBG Program, established in 1974, is designed to help communities remain viable by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expanded economic opportunities principally for low- to moderate-income persons.

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

Housing costs have risen steadily over the past ten years. According to the most recent projections available from the Shimberg Center for Housing Studies, housing cost burden in the City of Sunrise reached 48% in 2016. This cost burden is further compounded to 77% of low- to moderate-income households. As such, affordable housing continues to be the primary focus of the City's activities.

As evidenced by growth of annual allocations from 2013 through 2018, CDBG funding levels are anticipated to continue to increase gradually through the end of the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan cycle. Although these increased allocations do indicate a relief from the aggressive funding reductions seen in program years 2005 through 2012, the restoration of funds is not proportionate to the rising cost of housing expenses in the City. In order create the greatest possible impact for its low- to moderate-income residents, the City will continue to leverage state and federal funding sources to mitigate the impact of these fluctuations. Additionally, the City will continue its dynamic advocacy of affordable housing on local, state and federal levels.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

Multi-Family Residential Rental Housing Stimulus Program - \$500,000 Local Funds

The City's Office of Economic Development has developed a locally funded stimulus program known as the Multi-Family Residential Rental Housing Stimulus Program to encourage developers and landlords to invest in and upgrade multi-family residential rental properties for housing in the City's original neighborhoods.

Through this Stimulus Program, the City is helping to mitigate the adverse impacts associated with distressed rental properties by offering an incentive with a variety of eligible improvements to existing owners of older rental apartment properties and attracting new investors willing to explore redevelopment in these targeted areas.

Consistent with past performance, City staff will continue to seek out new and innovative approaches to providing affordable housing.

Grants

The City's primary focus remains on the development and maintenance of its affordable housing stock in an effort to ease housing cost burden for low-income families city-wide. As such, the majority of City's annual CDBG, HOME and SHIP allocations are targeted towards residential rehabilitation and purchase assistance programs which directly impact the City's most vulnerable populations. Where City resources are unable to assist, staff continues to coordinate referrals with local public and private entities who are able to provide additional, specialized programs and resources.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The Community Development Department is responsible for the Planning and Administration of the CDBG Consolidated Strategic Plan, Annual Action Plan, Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report (CAPER) and all other federal cross-cutting requirements associated with the CDBG program. Departmental staff meets with the Affordable Housing Advisory Board on a quarterly basis. The Redevelopment and Grants Division of the Community Development Department maintains a Memorandum of Understanding with the Leisure Services Department for the provision of the Senior Transportation Program. A similar Memorandum of Understanding is maintained with the Code Enforcement Division for the provision of Code Enforced Quality of Life activities in low-income census tracts.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The City maintains coordination as discussed above:

- Membership in local and state organizations
- Participation by City staff on boards, committees and agencies
- Discussions at committees supported by the City
