STORM SEASON BEGINS ON JUNE 1ST:

Prepare your yard, your home and your family!

Hurricane Season begins on June 1st and continues through November 30th. If you don't already have an emergency plan in place, now is the time to kick-start your storm preparations!



Start preparing your yard today! Once a hurricane watch or warning has been issued, it's too late to trim your trees and safely dispose of branches and other vegetation. Debris that's left outside can inflict serious damage to your home — or to your neighbors' homes — when the wind rises. It can also block roadways and slow the response of emergency personnel.

Now is the time to make sure your trees are trimmed and branches are disposed of properly. Take advantage of our weekly bulk trash collection to clean your yard and dispose of vegetation and other unwanted items.

Do not place anything out for garbage, recycling or bulk trash collection just before a storm. The disposal site closes and all collection services cease well-before a storm reaches us. Services will not resume until the weather is favorable and crews can safely collect items.

All bulk trash and garbage carts set out for collection prior to the issuance of a storm warning should be brought inside the residential structure or safely secured directly adjacent to the residential structure in a manner that does not create a significant risk of flying debris to neighboring property or residents. If the items remain curbside and cannot be collected by the service provider prior to the storm, they can become flying projectiles that are dangerous to your family and your community.



PREPARE YOUR HOME

Be sure that your homeowners (or renters) insurance is up to date, and that you have the shutters, hardware, and installation tools necessary to protect your windows and doors should a storm threaten our community.



PREPARE YOURSELF AND YOUR FAMILY

Assemble an Emergency Kit

If a storm hits, you may need to survive independently for several days. Prepare now by placing your family's necessities in plastic bins or bags that will keep them dry and portable. A basic emergency kit should contain a minimum three-day supply of water and non-perishable food for each household member, as well as medicine, a first aid kit, personal hygiene items, a radio and flashlights with extra batteries, and copies of important documents. Create a Communication Plan

It's important to maintain an up-to-date list of contact information and share it with family members and friends. Visit www.ready.gov/plan to create a customized Family Emergency Communication Plan.



Consider Your Medical Needs

The City of Sunrise is not in a hurricane evacuation zone. This means that healthy, non-vulnerable residents can remain in their home during a storm. If you are dependent on electricity for your medical needs, or if you have a medical condition that requires special care (but not hospitalization), a Broward County Special Needs Shelter may be appropriate for you. Pre-registration is strongly encouraged; visit www.broward.org/atrisk for an application, or call (954) 831-3902.

Residents who are at-risk due to frailty or disability — but who decide to stay home during a storm — are encouraged provide their contact information to Broward County's Vulnerable Population Registry. This tool helps the County and the City better plan for emergencies. To register, visit www.broward.org/atrisk or call 311.



STAY INFORMED

Sunrise uses the high-speed CodeRED notification system to alert residents in the event of a hurricane, boil water order or other emergency. You can decide how you want to be contacted: by phone, by text and/or by email. The only way to be sure you're in our database is to register. Visit www.sunrisefl.gov/codered to sign up online, or text AlertSunrise to 99411.
