- d. Dr. Stewart Discover Elementary: (a) Multicultural event on 10/26; (b) Participated in the Read for the Record event on 10/27; (c) Annual Storybook parade on 10/31; (d) Annual Parent University on 11/09 (e) Annual Harvest Food Drive (TBA).

Carolyn H Banyan Elementary: (a) Carolyn H. is working with the Banyan Principal on obtaining a food list for baskets, to provide to Kathy Osborne for families in need; (b) Sady D. was able to donate 30 books from her personal storybook stash for the Discovery Elementary Literally Night book drive.
- f. Natalia A. Horizon Elementary: (a) Looking for guest speakers for Career Day on 11/17. (b) The school is searching for a muralist to paint the media center. Kevin S. suggested to reach out to high school students within the area, in exchange for service hours. (c) Upcoming events: There will be a Fall Festival, Book Fair, and Movie

Night (d) Horizon Elementary is in the process of establishing a debate team. (e) There is a teacher shortage at the school, with 5 - 7 vacancies still need to be filed.

Old Business:

- a. Trick or Trot 10/20/22: 600+ people attended the Trick or Trot 2022 event.
- b. Read for the Record 10/27/22: Aldett F. and Dr. Stewart participated in Read for the Record 2022 on 10/27. Sady D. thanked everyone who participated at the literary event.
- c. Soca Step at City Park (Halloween Kick Off) 10/28/22: 200+ people attended event. Soca Step will resume in 2023 with fun themes and potential door prizes.
- d. Boo Bash at City Park 10/29/22: 5,000 + 7,000 people attended the event. It has been the largest Boo Bash thus far.

New Business:

- a. Parent Family Engagement Plan Village Elementary School: Sady D. provided a copy of the Village Elementary School PFEP Engagement Plan to the EAB to review (TBA).
- b. Cambridge Meeting at Piper High School February 2023: Sady D. spoke with Principal Hautigan at the IKEA 15th Year Anniversary, regarding the <u>Cambridge Program</u> presentation. Ms. Hautigan stated she will be hosting a meeting at Piper High School to further discuss the Cambridge Program and get additional area schools (Sunrise feeder schools) on board. The meeting will be held in February 2022 (no date has been set).
- c. Outstanding Citizenship Scholarship 11/1/22: The portal for <u>Broward Education Foundation scholarship site</u> went live on 11/01. The application for Outstanding Citizenship Scholarship is updated and currently being reviewed by Ada Griffin (Administrative Officer/Scholarship Liaison).
- d. Cultural Festival 11/5/22: Sady D. encouraged the EAB to share with their schools the Sunrise Cultural Festival taking place at City Park.
- e. SPEAKER Kathy Osborne, Social Worker (City of Sunrise Senior Center):
 - Social Worker The City has a <u>full-time social worker (Kathy Osborne)</u>, with an office in the <u>Sunrise Senior Center</u>, who helps eligible residents of all ages obtain federal, state and/or local assistance. The office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.
 - Compassion Center During the COVID Pandemic the Compassion Center was introduced to the community and helped filtering 5,000+ calls. The Compassion Center was originally created in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the City of Sunrise recognized a growing need to provide a one-stop location for residents/ businesses to call/email for resources and assistance in dealing with the public health and safety crisis. The Compassion Center became a support hub for Sunrise residents/businesses providing direct services and referrals, advocacy, and assistance with COVID-19 recovery resources. Additionally, residents were provided with information on healthcare, regional food pantries, transportation, and financial referral resources (to offset or pay for utilities/rent/mortgage). The Compassion Center continues to be an information hub to access food resources, utilities assistance, transportation services, and community-specific information on pharmacies/grocery stores and navigating through State/Federal programs.
 - Emergency Assistance Fund (EAF) Donations are made to this fund by the local business community/ civic groups and individuals to help provide financial assistance for qualified residents in emergency situations.

The EAF is provided to help with financial assistance for qualified residents in *emergency situations*. The EAF helps with utility bills, to avoid service disruptions.

- Fee Waiver Program The City of Sunrise offers a fee waiver program for designated youth recreational programs allowing qualified disadvantaged youth to participate in athletic or camp programs. The fee waiver is based on current *Federal Poverty Guidelines*, residents are screened/registered for the waivers through the office of the Sunrise Social Worker.
- Crisis Closet Canned food is collected/distributed to supplement groceries to eligible residents in time of emergency. Durable medical equipment including canes, walkers and wheelchairs are also available *on loan* to residents in need of these supplies.
- Thanksgiving Baskets The City distributes approximately 200 baskets to Sunrise families in need. Families are referred to Kathy O. (City Social Worker) by front facing departments, schools, and resident/business referrals. Families receive large food baskets (including fresh fruits/veggies, dried goods, and Publix gift card) and City employees donate their turkey vouchers. Dr. Stewart suggested to contact Publix for additional food donations.
- Holiday Breakfast Party Empty toy boxes are being wrapped/distributed to each department for employees to donate toys. New families are selected every year (35-40 families to participate in the event). Participants are nominated by social workers at Sunrise schools and Kathy O. encouraged the EAB if they are aware of ANY families (who are residents) to please submit their names. Board members are able to nominate families from their schools with 3+ children in their family.
