During an unrelated unfolding Administrative Investigation and subsequent Criminal Investigation into the alleged misconduct of Sunrise Police Sergeant, herein referred to as Sergeant #2 – IA CASE 23-06-01, certain protective measures were deployed to ensure the overall safety and security of our Public Safety Building, specific to our IT vulnerability.

As such, members of the Broward County Sheriff's Office were utilized to provide recommendations on building security as it relates to IT Security. Members from the Broward Sheriff's Office conducted security checks in various high liability areas, to include During a safety sweep of this suite, a cellular phone was located on the overhead cable run ("L" shaped indention running above the cubicles, approximately 1 foot below the ceiling tiles, on the west side of the suite). The phone was taken into the custody of Internal Affairs personnel.

II. INVESTIGATIVE NARRATIVE:

investigation conducted by Detective

During an unrelated unfolding Administrative Investigation and subsequent Criminal Investigation into the alleged misconduct of Sunrise Police Sergeant, herein referred to as Sergeant #2 – IA CASE 23-06-01, certain protective measures were deployed to ensure the overall safety and security of our Public Safety Building, specific to our IT vulnerability.

As such, members of the Broward County Sheriff's Office were utilized to provide recommendations on building security as it relates to IT Security. Members from the Broward Sheriff's Office conducted security checks in various high liability areas, to include During a safety sweep of this suite, a cellular phone was located on the overhead cable run ("L" shaped indention running above the cubicles, approximately 1 foot below the ceiling tiles, on the west side of the suite). The phone was taken into the custody of Internal Affairs personnel.
Based upon the fact the cellular phone was located in a "common" area of the SIS Suite, care custody and control of the phone before it came to rest in the cable run was not immediately able to be determined. As such, all members of SIS – Civilians, Detectives, and Supervisors were issued 5 Day Notices.
Contemporaneous with the decision to issue 5 Day Notices, I enlisted the assistance of Detective from our Digital Investigations Unit. I tasked Detective with identifying the owner of the cellular phone, the phone number associated with the phone or any other information linking the cellular phone to its owner or any Sunrise PD case.
Detective was able to provide a phone number for the cellular phone and documented his findings on a sworn written report. The phone number discovered was 727-227-0262.
While querying the phone number through our RMS Database, I was able to discover that the phone number was attached to Sunrise Police Department case number 42-2301-003550. The owner of the phone was listed as <u>Danny Walker</u> , who was the subject of a Burglary

The following is a time line of the Burglary investigation(s) conducted by Detective and members of SIS as it relates to the arrest of suspect Danny Walker.

December 6, 2022 – 21 V at One Fitness Parking lot – SPD Case 42-2212-052972

Assigned to Det.

January 9, 2023 – Sergeant begins new assignment as SIS Supervisor

January 22, 2023 – 21V at Markham Park – SPD Case 42-2301-003550

Assigned to Det.

February 9, 2023 – Det. and members conduct take down of vehicle burglary suspects after on-viewing a 21V at 11 SW 24th Ave in the City of Deerfield Beach.


• BWC footage from Det. revealed that during the take down of suspected vehicle burglar Danny Walker, his cellular phone fell to the ground. The phone was recovered by Det.





- Danny Walker is arrested by under BSO Case 10-2302-001578
- Inmate property receipt for Danny Walker does not reflect a cellular phone
- Sunrise Property and Evidence does not show any property associated with either of the aforementioned cases listed in their custody.
- No property receipt or chain of custody documentation for Danny Walker's phone attached to either report or listed in evidence.com

Continuing on February 9, 2023 – Det. authors a search warrant for the T-Mobile historical cell site location (CSLI) of Danny Walker's above pictured cellular phone 772-227-0262. The warrant is signed by the Honorable Judge Barbara Duffy.



February 22, 2023 – Det. authors an arrest warrant for Danny Walker which is granted by the Honorable Judge Michael Rothschild.

February 23, 2023 – Italian takes Danny Walker into custody for the outstanding warrant.

April 24, 2023 – Case filing recommendations are received from the Broward County SAO declining the case against Danny Walker.

April 30, 2023 – Sergeant reassigned to Road Patrol.

May 1, 2023 – Sergeant is assigned to SIS.

July 9, 2023 – Detectives are reassigned to Road Patrol.




August 7, 2023 - Command Staff briefed and investigation authorized.


 SIM Card from the phone revealed the last number registered was 772 227 0262. The number was found to be directly associated with Danny Walker.


August 8-9, 2023 – Report and information gathering revealed that the CSLI Search warrant was not memorialized in evidence.com, nor made part of the case filing packet sent to the SAO. Broward County Clerk of Court DOES NOT have record of the CSLI search warrant ever being clerked. I was able to obtain a copy of the CSLI warrant via a T-Mobile LEO representative.

While searching for BWC footage from members of SIS on February 9, 2023 the only footage found was a 3-minute video recorded by Detective during the takedown of Danny Walker mentioned above. After reviewing this video, I was able to positively confirm that the phone in his possession at the time of the take down is Danny Walker's phone. The back case is a unique gold color with a unique black design. Furthermore, Detective activates the screen of the phone and his BWC captures the unique home screen image, which is the exact same image as the phone found in SIS.














When asked if he had any contact with Danny Walker after February 9, 2023, Detective stated that he did have contact with him in August of 2023, and took part in his arrest for burglary (the same burglary investigation Detective referenced). According to Detective he spent several hours with Danny Walker during his subsequent arrest in August of 2023, and Detective did not believe that Danny Walker ever made any mention of his cellular phone or asked about his cellular phone stemming from the February 9 th take down.
On November 7, 2023, Detectives and along with Criminal Intelligence Analyst were all issued an Official Notice of an Internal Affairs Investigation. All three agreed to provide a statement the same day.
I interviewed Detective in 5 th Floor Administrative Conference Room and took a sworn, recorded Statement. Detective received the entire case file before she provided her statement, and she did not bring an attorney or representative to the interview. Detective holds a Task Force Officer position and as such, she is detached and does not frequently conduct police business at the PSB. Detective does not retain a physical workspace within the SIS Suite, but does retain access to said suite. Detective stated that she did not have any part in the take down of Danny Walker on February 9, 2023, nor did she ever have any contact with Danny Walker. Finally, Detective stated that she had no knowledge of Danny Walker's cellular phone or the location of his phone inside the SIS Suite.
I then interviewed Criminal Intelligence Analyst in the 5 th Floor Administrative Conference Room and took a sworn, recorded Statement. Criminal Intelligence Analyst received the entire case file before she provided her statement, and she did not bring an attorney or representative to the interview. Criminal Intelligence Analyst holds a civilian position within the Investigations Division and as such, does not participate in any law enforcement actions or operations. Criminal Intelligence Analyst stated that she conducted a vast and thorough background investigation into Danny Walker and provided her findings to SIS Detectives. Criminal Intelligence Analyst stated that she did not have any knowledge of Danny Walker's cellular phone, nor any knowledge of the phone's location inside the SIS Suite. When asked about cubicle arrangements and what Detectives are assigned to the individual cubicles, Criminal Intelligence Analyst stated that she believed the cubicle directly below where the phone was located was occupied by Detective












The final point I touch on is access within the SIS Suite. Officer confirms that at the time of his assignment to SIS, access to the suite was limited to SIS members and supervisors only (access is now granted to all Investigations Personnel).

III. INVESTIGATIVE FINDINGS and DISPOSITION:
If the allegation is true, Police Officer and Police Officer would have violated the following Sunrise Police Policy and Procedure:
Chapter 39 – Evidence Procedures:
 39.6.5.1. Members are prohibited from storing evidence or any other property that comes into their possession within personal desks, vehicles, homes or any other non- designated locations not authorized by the Department.
Based on a preponderance of evidence standard, I have concluded that Officer and Officer did violate the Sunrise Police Department's Evidence Procedures, specifically, 39.6.5.1. I was able to come to this conclusion based upon the fact that both officers were extremely upfront and honest during their respective interviews. I found no ambiguity or uncertainty from either officer, and both took responsibility for their actions / inactions. The facts and circumstances that led me to my conclusion are as follows:
The established timeline of events, connected cases, and the CSLI Search Warrant cultivated a clear nexus to Officer and his role as the lead investigator. The connected BWC footage formed a clear nexus to Officer in taking possession Danny Walker's cellular phone on February 9, 2023.
While interviewing Officer he immediately and without hesitation stated that he did have knowledge of the location of the cellular phone within the SIS Suite and he was extremely forthcoming with not only his culpability, but his remorse and regret for the mistakene made. Below is an excerpt from Officer interview as he outlines how the cellular phone ended up in the cable run:
Q: Um, do you know how the phone ended up in the cable run? A: I do. Yeah. Q: All right. Do you wanna just kinda detail that out for me?

A: Sure. Uh, so, during that time period, without getting into too many details, whatever, um,

and I, uh, were dealing with quite a lot of stress and just interesting,

We were trying to joke as much as possible, just get our minds off it and whatever. So, we would make fun of or poke fun at, I should say, um, the fact that when our sergeant, our then sergeant, which was Sergeant, uh. or when he was in his office, uh, he would yawn excessively loud and then throw his phone on the desk, um, which sounded like he was shot putting it from a mountaintop. Um, and his vawn sounded like a lion's roar. So, me joking around after a stressful day dealing with, um, people that were in the unit, I started to screw around and make the yawning noises and lean back like he would and then throw a phone in the air and hit the desk or hit the floor or whatever. Um, so I did it a few times. And then during - while doing it, (Danny Walker)'s phone was there on the desk. And I leaned back, did a loud yawning noise, and ahhh. And then threw the phone up. And my cubicle was right across from seems. And well, right above me is the cable run. And unfortunately, it went up there. Um, and I'm 5'6" on a great day. And trying to get up there to retrieve it was a little impossible, um, from a chair. And, uh, yeah. Shortly after that I tried to figure out how to get it whatever. We didn't have a ladder at the time. And, um, you know, shortly after that whether it was the next day whatever, uh, we get pulled to start handling a bunch of other cases and everything. And honestly, I just forgot about it. So, yeah. Q: Okay. Um, so from what it sounds like...you had no malicious intent to... A: Correct. Q: ...put the phone up there. Is that... A: Yeah. O: ...that's correct? A: No malicious intent to - to take the phone from - from (Danny Walker) or to hide the phone. There's literally no reason to, so, um. Q: It was, uh, it sounds like more like you - you guys were incredibly busy. And then... A: Yeah. Q: ...got pulled and... A: Yeah. Q: ...simply forgot. Is that it...? A: ...very accurate. Yeah. confirms that Officer was present and witness to him throwing the cellular phone into the air and it landing on the ledge of the cable run. states that he and Officer did plan to seek out the building maintenance personnel (PSA) or but with the immense workload they both had, this was overlooked and the phone was never retrieved. Officer does state that he is aware of the proper procedures regarding the placement of evidence and states that he has always followed the established evidence submission procedures. He states that this instance is a lapse in judgement and gives the impression that this is not his normal practice, this was an oversite that he truly regrets. I found that he was equally as forthcoming and open While Interviewing Officer about the entire situation. Below is an excerpt from Officer regarding the events leading up to, during, and after the cellular phone came into his investigative purview:

Q: ...Do you remember, uh, who took the phone from the scene of the takedown back to the police department?

A: Yeah, Detective

Um, as it was explained to me by him, he took it from (Danny Walker's) person and he was gonna take it back to the PD for me and I would complete the warrant...and this is common practice in our unit. We - we took it back to one of our desks, put it in a Faraday bag with a power supply, that way, as you know, no one can, uh, remotely access it or remotely dump all the information in there. Um, but as far as where it ultimately ended up, uh, yeah, I do know where it ended up and how.

Q: All right, do you wanna, um, just kind of elaborate on...

A: Yeah.

Q: ...how it ended - the phone ended up in the cable run?

A: So, um, on occasion, or I guess more than on occasion, several times a day, our - our supervisor at the time would yawn extremely loudly, and you would hear a phone hitting the desk, uh, while we're trying to work, so it was distracting. So, uh, and I did a lot together in the unit. We were basically - I mean, I guess you could consider us partners. And we were - we were stressed out by the - the workload, the supervisors, e- you know, all the above. And to relieve some of that we would mess around in the office. We'd - we would joke around. And due to the fact that it sounded like the supervisor would drop his phone from like 10 feet above the table, uh, was making fun of him and he mockingly yawned loudly and then, like, threw the phone up in the air to make it land on the table loudly. Um, as a result, he threw it like a - a little higher than he planned, I think, and it landed in the - what's it called?

Q: Cable run?

A: Yeah, the cable run, which is above his cubicle. Um, and we obviously said, "Hey, we need to get that down because it's still a piece of evidence." Um, but we didn't have a means to do so that day, and that was the end of the day. That was - I - I think it was like 5 or 6 o'clock. We were gettin' ready to go home for the day. So we decided when we come in tomorrow, or whenever our next workday was -- I don't know what day of the week it was -- uh, we'll get a ladder from (or one of the building guys and we'll get it down and throw it in evidence 'cause there's nothing else to do with it. So, um, ultimately, we forgot. We - you know, we were just inundated with cases and stress and - I don't want to throw dirt on anyone else that was in the unit, but and I were doing a lot of work, like we were swamped one case to the next.

Q: Um, all right, so, o- obviously, what I'm getting is it was in a joking manner, uh, to relieve stress. Was, um, throwing the phone up there and - or forgetting that it was up there, was that intentional on your - on your guys' part?

A: No.

Q: Can't speak for - for, uh,

A: Right.

Q: It's just for yourself.

A: No, it wasn't intentional. I mean, 'cause even when it happened, we looked at each other like, "All right, you need to stop messin' around and get it down, 'cause at the end of the day, it's still somebody's property.

IV: CONCLUSION

Based upon my investigation and the statements provided, I have concluded and Officer and Officer did violate Sunrise Police Department Procedure Chapter 39, specifically 39.6.5.1.		
Officer did admit to throwing the phone into the air and on to the learn inside the SIS Suite. Officer then confirmed the actions of as he was witness to them. In witnessing the actions of Officer did not remedy or correct the situation as the lead investigator.	Officer	
Officer and Officer were both very open and straight respective statements, with each independently taking ownership and response actions and / or inactions. Both officers expressed that there was no malicious their actions and both noted that their behavior was borne out of a hostile and environment created by their supervisor.	sibility for their us intent behind	
Despite their direct and honest ownership of their behavior, this does not neg both are equally culpable for mishandling the cellular phone.	ate the fact that	
In order to provide full and unyielding context to the entire situation, I feel it is important to mention that, at the time of this incident, the SIS Suite did have restricted card access, limited to only SIS personnel and supervisors. As such, one may view this area as a quasi-secure area. It is important to note that there is no evidence to support that the cellular phone ever left the SIS Suite after it was brought back to the PSB by Officer All evidence suggests that it remained in the SIS Suite, which at that time was a restricted access area. This fact in no way negates the policy violation, but does provide some compurgation to the overall situation.
